1. Introduction

The Role of Music Education in 6th Grade

The 6th Grade Music curriculum introduces students to music as a global language that communicates across time, cultures, and personal stories. Students learn to read music, understand rhythm and melody, explore the history of American music, and connect storytelling with musical expression. By exploring instruments, traditions, and stories from cultures around the world—especially the Middle East—students build musical literacy, cultural awareness, and artistic confidence.

By the end of this course, students will:

- ✓ Read basic musical notation and perform rhythmic patterns.
- ✓ Identify key genres and figures in American music history.
- ✓ Compose short pieces that tell stories through music.
- ✓ Explore instruments, scales, and rhythms from Middle Eastern traditions.
- ✓ Reflect on music's role in identity, storytelling, and social change.

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2. Core Competence Areas

MUS.1 Music Literacy and Notation

Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- ✓ Read and interpret rhythmic and melodic notation on the staff.
- ✓ Understand musical symbols, tempo markings, and dynamics.
- **✓** Perform short notated passages using voice or instruments.

MUS.2 History of American Music

- ✓ Trace the roots and evolution of key American music styles.
- ✓ Recognize influential artists and their cultural impact.
- √ Compare how different genres reflect social and historical movements.

- Study spirituals, jazz, blues, rock, hip-hop, and pop.
- Create timelines of key events and musical innovations.

- Reflect on how artists use music to express identity, protest, and resilience.

MUS.3 Music and Storytelling

- ✓ Use music to convey emotion, narrative, and atmosphere.
- √ Compose original soundscapes and story scores.
- ✓ Identify how composers create character and mood in music.

- Use percussion and voice to convey setting and suspense.

By the end of this unit, students will be able to:

- ✓ Explore instruments, modes, and rhythms from Middle Eastern music.
- ✓ Understand the cultural significance of music in storytelling and ritual.
- ✓ Participate in cross-cultural musical appreciation and reflection.

- Identify the oud, darbuka, ney, and qanun.
- Clap and play simple magam-based rhythmic patterns.

- Compare cultural contexts and musical expressions of celebration, prayer, and storytelling.

- **✓** Encourage improvisation and layered rhythm exploration.
- √ Use call-and-response and layered percussion circles.

Cultural and Digital Integration

- ✓ Use YouTube, Smithsonian Folkways, and NPR Tiny Desk.
- ✓ Digital tools: Soundtrap, Audacity, GarageBand for creation.

Learning Culture

- ✓ Celebrate diverse musical traditions and student voices.
- **✓** Foster risk-taking in performance and creative tasks.
- **✓** Reflect on music's power to move, heal, and tell stories.

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
